

Out of the Mouths of Babes

One Easter Sunday morning as the pastor was preaching a children's sermon, he reached into his bag of props and pulled out an egg. He pointed at the egg and asked the children, "What's in here?"

"I know, I know!" a little boy exclaimed, "pantyhose!"





I spent many days in the summers of my childhood picking through slag piles on the Keweenaw Peninsula. (that's in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan for those unfamiliar with the geography). The tall stacks of debris were leftovers from the copper mines, whose carved-out entrances were often nearby, gathering water and litter. These discarded rocks still had slivers of copper in them, but not enough for the mining companies to bother with. So they were tossed aside and left to crumble, to avalanche, and to get sorted by amateur rock hounds, such as my family, who were looking for capillaries of greenish metal. The piles were waste, a stumbling-block for those who did not watch their steps. They were a reminder of an era when human beings took what they wanted from the world around them and left the refuse behind.

Nature does, however, reclaim some of our messes. Thorn bushes and some low-lying berry patches grew in the more worn stones. Snakes and insects found places to hide from the mid-day sun and from predators. I suppose raccoons and skunks might have skirted around the edges, looking for prey, if our tumbling of rejected rocks hadn't scared them into hiding. Rain and snow have pounded sections into dirt durable enough to hold saplings and tall grass. Nature, given time and non-interference, can erase our cavalier use of its resources.

As a Christian, I believe that all that is around me is, directly and indirectly, a gift from God. Trees, Mountains, fertile fields-all God's presents. The buildings we live in, the clothes we wear, the technology we enjoy and sometimes throw away for something better-all products of human creativity, itself an attribute that God gave us. Reptiles, Amphibians, Fish, Birds, and our fellow mammals-all issued from the drive for procreation and companionship set in us by God's enduring love. If we pull back the layers upon layers of life, the intricate connections of what surrounds us, I believe that it all stems from God. The Psalmist was right indeed-all of this belongs to God and is given to us only as a matter of safe-keeping, a matter of stewardship. We are called by God to be the caregivers of creation, therefore, though we often disagree on how to do this.

How we resolve this disagreement is vital for our world's survival and for our own well-being. I once had a parishioner tell me that he thought people could do whatever they wanted to nature because God had left us in charge. His understanding was the dominion promised to us in Genesis 1 was a license, permission to lord it over all of what God had created. I kept silent, but I went home to look at the passage in Hebrew. God gave humanity a superior position, a gift graced to them because they were made in God's image. Though the meaning of this phrase is highly debated, it asks to consider what we share in common with God—creativity, compassion, a curious intelligence, and the organizational skills necessary to rise above bare instinct and to build civilizations capable of adapting to change and to need. So this dominion is not merely about power, it is about using power wisely. It is not about meeting our needs, but the needs of the future; it is not about taking care of just people and animals we know, but it about taking care of people and worlds we can barely imagine. Why? Because if we are called to lead as God would, to be the imitators as the image of God contained with us urges us to do, we must do what as God would. Would God litter, pollute, exploit, and destroy with no thought of what might come after? I believe, with my whole heart, the clear answer to that is 'no'.

So on Earth Day I may go outside for a walk. It will not matter if it is raining or clear. I will remind myself to put plastic and newspaper into my recycling bin. I will pay attention if there is a news report about industrial waste and other careless treatment of the environment and write my representatives to express my concern. Most of all, I will bag all the litter I find and make sure that all I find is disposed of properly.

I will not be doing this to make a political statement, but rather because of what I believe about God. If God has placed me to here to take care of the world around me, I need to pick up the garbage. I aim to be a better steward, a better caregiver, of what the world gives me, so I will sort through what I throw away to make I am not tossing something that is reusable. Most of all, I want to be appreciative, yes, even deeply thankful, just as I was when I rustled through the rocks looking for thin green lines and, at the same time, absorbing the beauty of the contours of every stone. To recognize the giftedness of it all and to respond accordingly. I can think of no better way to celebrate the day.


