

Thawing

"Then God issues his word and melts (snow) away! God makes his winds blow; the water flows again." Psalm 147: 18

Most years, in the middle of February, winter breaks. The wind lessens and the snow dwindles. Lake Michigan's moderating effects prompt temperatures to rise so we begin to see grass beneath waning ice. It feels safe to walk among growing puddles of water again. I find myself, in those times, removing the hood from my

head and unzipping my jacket. In the lingering of winter, I notice that it is not a singular season; something warmer, fresher, and more life-nurturing is coming. I simply have to learn how to wait for it, even when my kitchen thermometer bottoms out again and I watch drifts pummel the yellow siding of my porch.

Our psalmist is referring to a winter of his/her and his/her people's soul. Something-famine, an encroaching enemy, a decline of people even noticing that God is there-has brought the impact and the threat of calamity. Isolation, fear, despair, and a deep sense of loss are all that remain and our writer remains frozen in place, unable even to utter a mute cry for help. Yet, something within still stirs in this barren hinterland. God is still working and speaking. Winters may come, unwelcomed and unprepared for, but they will also pass. Something livelier always follows-a bloom, a new crop, a reaching out of song and trust to God. God warms God's people's spirits even as they experience the coldness of turning away from God. God speaks and ice drips into water. God shouts with joy and river gush down high mountains.

In that moment of mid-winter thaw, Lent often falls. Lent, from the Latin for the lengthening of days, is, at least in northern climes, made for the arrival of spring. This season of self-reflection, of turning away from harmful habits, of contemplated how often we pursue things far less worthy than God, is my faith's way of doing spring cleaning. It is the Christian manner of tossing what is no longer useful and healthy, of whisking and dusting away what is blocking us from seeing and experiencing the growing and healing glory of God. It is our way of turning away from the clutter of our lives so we can focus on what Jesus did for us: He lived out the life of God so fully that, though it led to his betrayal and death on a cruel cross, not even death and evil could keep him in the grave. Yet there is more here: if we can sweep away the noise and the blurriness in our lives, through the ever-blowing winds of God, nothing can separate us from God's love-not hate, not time, not age, not what we have done wrong, not what we have left undone, not pain, not sorrow, and not

even death itself. If we allow Jesus' life to touch us in all our bareness and vulnerability, we have a new and permanent lease on life. Our hearts and minds will not remain frozen and lifeless, but we will meet and flow into God's vast river of life.

On the 14th of February, we will gather for Ash Wednesday, the official starting day of this thawing season. We will spread ashes on our foreheads to give us a tangible reminder that we are broken and temporary in this broken and temporary place. We will listen to stories of how we break and how we heal, how we search for and how we find God's peace and strength. We will gather around a table that Jesus laid out and share bread and wine, common items that he made even more meaningful. As we eat morsels of pita bread and drink small cups of grape juice somehow the story of his crucifixion and resurrection strikes us as more real than before because we have touched and tasted something that makes his love and his hope burst to life. If we are open to what God is up to, maybe we will be moved. Maybe we will hear a word from God. And maybe we will be thawed and broken as the snow is in the coming spring, free to flow to God's vast ocean of peace.
