




Stewardship is a way to say 'Thank You'



"Whoever is faithful with little is also faithful with much, and the one who is dishonest with little is also dishonest with much. If you haven't been faithful with worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches?" Luke 16:10-11 CEB

Some stories that Jesus told are easy to preach about. The Good Samaritan. The Prodigal Son both of these lend themselves to sometimes hard but easy to understand lessons. The lines I quoted above come from one of Jesus' most challenging parables-the story commonly called the parable of the Unjust Steward. A man fires one of his money managers because he really isn't doing his job. The soon-to-be-unemployed realizes his essential laziness and unfitness for physical labor and so devises a clever way to win influence and friends. He manages to half all of the debts that others owe his former boss thus saving them considerable cash and winning their gratitude (and perhaps a place to stay when his money runs out.) His former boss commends him for his devious cleverness-the surest letter of reference in those times for another position. Jesus also admires the crook and his smarts and urges his followers to be as clever with the gifts from God he is giving them. He goes on further to suggest that the world of wealth is an often corrupt one and one has to wickedly wise to survive; if you cannot succeed in the ways the world around you demands, even if it means getting your hands dirty, how are you going to be successful in the far more demanding world of God's gifts and riches? This invitation, which seems to encourage tricking your neighbors, embezzlement, and sheer criminal craftiness, is hardly the ideal Sunday School lesson we, let alone our children, need to learn.

But if we get stuck on those details, we miss Jesus' point entirely. The unjust steward is commended not because he is crooked but because he is clever. He is using the talents he has been given. He has clear insight into his shortcoming and deep understanding of the people around him. He knows he cannot survive on his own and he suspects that neither can anyone else. So he uses money and his business savvy to create a network of support strong enough to carry him through the hard times ahead. In the end, he has used his God-given smarts in a way that benefits both him and the people around him, although his intentions were a bit more self-serving. Strangely, he has looked out for his neighbors much the way he looked after himself. It would be asking much to consider this a kind of love, a kind of compassion, but it is honoring God's commandment for mutual care and commitment to your fellow human beings. Somehow he has managed to use his talents crookedly but well-at least it might look that way in the eyes of God. I think even Jesus had to smile when he was adding his take on this not so conventional way of going about pleasing God.

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
So what pleases God? During this month, my denomination, the United Church of Christ, recognizes Stewardship Sunday as a day to recognize what we have been given and how we are supposed to give back with what we have been given. I do not find it coincidental that we also celebrate Thanksgiving during the same month. Being good stewards, good caretakers and good choosers of what we have is a way of saying 'thank you'. It is recognizing the privilege of the time, the talent, and the resources that we have been given and then, as a way of being grateful, using them well. Using them well means benefiting not just ourselves, but also the world around us and our fellow creatures as well. Even the most elaborate cathedral or the most well-paid minister or the most celebrated charity is no substitute for acts of kindness and compassion that help feed, shelter, heal, and give hope to this world and to our fellow inhabitants when they are the most in need.

Doing that pleases God, even if our motives are not completely devoid of self-service (how are we really going be completely selfless?) and even if make a mess of what are trying to do (and how do we not do just that?). Maybe as we reflect on how to be users of the gifts we have been given and as we reflect on how we can thankful for what we have, we should take a clue from the unjust steward. Use your gifts to make friends and better the world. Be clever in your compassion and your care-you can take care of yourself but don't forget that your well-being depends on everyone else's. Show your gratitude by doing something creative, constructive, and life-giving with what you have.

I think, perhaps, that might be the best way to be thankful, the best way to earn the wry smile of Jesus.
