

"God has told you, human one, what is good and what the LORD requires from you: to do justice, embrace faithful love, and walk humbly with your God." Micah 6:8 CEB

It has become a pastor's habit to ruminate long and hard over the December newsletter column. After all, what more can be said about the month in which we celebrate Jesus' birth in the hundreds of years since we co-opted the holiday from the Northern European Celts and Picts? I could paint gauzy and song-drenched depictions of shepherds, angels and stars, of a child nestled silently in hay and wrapped in the whitest rags you could imagine, but that would only strain every nerve the historian in me possesses. I could describe the hardness of the journey his mother took just before his birth, stress the political circumstances that made the journey necessary, and note sadly how quickly his family went on the run because of the ruthlessness of the powers that were, but most people want to hear Christmas carols this time of year, not laments. I wonder, at times, if it would better to let centuries of better writers speak and retain a respectful and appreciative silence.

But Christmas is too important to keep silent and my voice might be one that God uses to keep December 25th from fading into just another day for someone so, with fear and trembling, I stumble through helpless yet helpful words. So I peruse my calendar in search of the connections between our days to jar some speck of inspiration. I happen upon December 10th-Human Rights Day, a day set aside to recognize the United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted in 1948 amid clashes between the capitalist and the communist worlds. This non-binding document urges countries to adopt policies that preserve individual and corporate freedoms, such as the freedoms of speech, of movement, of practicing one's faith, to preserve privacy and safety, to seek asylum, to marry, and to pursue economic opportunity and social security. This was meant to be a blueprint for a more just and more prosperous world and, historically speaking, when countries are willing to keep their citizens' rights healthy and possible it does create a more vibrant, fairer world. These basic rights are always a challenge to those who wish to consolidate power and to streamline the system by eliminate unnecessary opposition so it is pay at least yearly attention to them lest we forget how necessary they are to our health and well-being.

This dry talk prompts me to wonder about Christmas. What do human rights, important as they are, have to do with the birth of Christ? If we take the idea of the Incarnation seriously, my answer would have to be 'everything.' Jesus emerged into the maw of life. He was not an archetypal, paper doll baby. He was born poor in a world that valued mostly the wealthy. He was born a Jew in a world competing for the coveted Roman citizenship with all its accompanying Latinized cultural apparatus. He came into a world that exploited the builder, the craftsperson, and the ditch-digger, and spent most of his life as a handyman. He grew up to be a rebel in a world that insisted, with sword and execution, on conformity. He was raised in a spiritual worldview that saw God who worked in history and who sided with the forgotten. He showed his disdain for the worship of money and fame. Jesus came indeed as more than just 'one of us.'; he came as one of the least of us, one who walked with the sick, the rejected, the wrong-gendered, and the refugee. Jesus recognize the dignity and the hope of each person he encountered and, if they took his words and his touch seriously enough, changed them by meeting their deepest and most intense needs. He gave them dignity, freedom of movement, the safety of a home, and the hope of God's enduring and empowering love. This often inspired these same men and women to lift up the poor, to share with the hungry, to care for the forgotten, and to speak to power on behalf of the oppressed even to the present day. Jesus gave each person who encountered him, then and now, certain God-given, inalienable, and precious rights that cannot be taken from them. What can this world strip away if it cannot remove from these people the knowledge that they are treasured and loved by God and are about good and healing work?


Our human rights are a gift from God, ones that should never be taken away from us without severe consequences. Prophets yesterday and today have warmed us that when we strip people's dignity from them we will pay as a society. God will let us reap just what we have sown-evil for evil, injustice for injustice, loss for loss. The more we strip away, the more we will lose. We will forfeit our good fortune and our possibilities because of the heart of Christmas. By God coming down to us in Jesus and giving us the ability and the hope of rising above the sordid and violent brokenness of our worst nature, God has given us back ourselves, our dreams, and our true freedom-our best rights. What better gift could we have been given?

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
