## The Churchmouse

Kin-dom"Jesus said, 'I assure anyone who has left house, brothers, sisters, mother, father, or farms because of me and because of the good news will receive one hundreds of time more now in this life." Mark 10:28-29 CEB

The realm of God is not consigned to a place. It is expressed in relationships realized this while I was in quarantine for Co-Vid in a hotel room in Lisbon, Portugal. On the surface, I had little to find discomfiting. My accomodations were small but comfortable. I had a window I could open for fresh air and traffic noise. My credit card and my phone made it easy to order three meals a day. I had space enough to walk when I felt up to it. The floor was tile so I did not run a groove into some carpeting. I spent my time reading, resting, writing, sweeping crumbs into my wastebasket, and watching endless reruns on British television. I even spent time trying to parse sense out of the Portuguese newscasts.I remained, however, a long five days. Many of us who travel abroad know the feeling of disconnection common in a country that does not speak the language you know the best. Many Portuguese speak English fluently but their life experiences, their customs convey private meanings that no foreigner can penetrate easily. I must admit that I enjoy traveling with a busload of strangers that speak my tongue. We share something in common that provides some shade when I am confronted by the novelty of another land. During my quarantine, I must admit, I found myself alone. At least, so I thought. I felt the twinge of fear that often comes with challenging situations. One version of a traveler's night unspools as thus: you are sick in a land you are unfamiliar with. You do not know where to turn if things should take a turn for the worse. You are unfamiliar with your options. This is a thought best chased away and yet here I found myself in its midst. It is easy in such situations, no matter how comfortable, to become self-pitying. But something would not let me stay in those depths. I quickly discovered how to make international connections and contacted my travel agent and my



son to tell them what was happening. My son called my church to get prayers started. At the end of my first day, I heard a knock on my door. It was a tour guide who lived nearby. My travel agency had gotten a hold of her and asked that she checked on me. Since she had recently recovered from the illness herself, we discussed my symptoms and what I needed to be on the look out for. She assured me that she would call my son and reassure him. She urged me to open the window and get some fresh air and the sound of life into my room. Then she gave me her number and promised me that she would visit again in two days. When she did, she brought me more books to read and told me not to worry about returning them. Her husband was Canadian and had plenty of English language books. The travel agency itself phoned daily to arrange for alternative flights and to answer questions. I know that I repeated many questions, but no one showed the least bit of impatience. I also read the note that one of my fellow travelers left behind sharing their experience with Co-Vid isolation in a foreign land and insisting that I call them when I got home. Most of all, I am grateful to the hotel's desk crew. They ordered meals, purchased Tylenol, printed flight schedules and e-tickets, and checked diligently each morning to see how I was faring. I suspect that they were as happy as I was when I went for a walk around the city block to celebrate the end of my quarantine. I share this tale not to ask for sympathy. Many have suffered from this disease longer and harder than I did. In the end, I was minorly inconvenienced and I am grateful that I was vaccinated. Rather, I tell it to reflect on a truth that continues to impress itself upon me. We are built and maintained by community. The contours of our lives, for good or ill, depend on the company we keep. I would dare carry this one step further: our realization of what God's realm truly is also dependent on who we talk to and who we listen to. Whether it is a place of exclusion and judgment or a place of gracious love. Whether it is a pecking order or an opportunity to find more freedom. Whether it is a terrain of fear or a plain of hopeall of this depends on who we chose to be kin to.

Jesus found he had to address this quickly in his ministry. From the start, his ministry of inclusion and care caused the religious authorities to reject and exclude him. These same authorities rejected those who chose to walk in his footsteps as well. I suspect that they often wondered if the good news they chose to listen to would turn out to be all that good; they had left their family and friends behind. They have felt the sting of exclusion. Were they choosing a path of utter loneliness? So Jesus offered them and us these words of assurance. You will never be alone. Follow me and you will always find family, even where you least expect it. Embrace all of God's creation and you will always discover a home. You may leave some behind, but ahead of you lies people waiting to meet you. You will never, ever be alone. Sometimes I am asked what I think about the Kingdom of God. I reply that I am not much for monarchies. More seriously, I offer this reflection. I search for the kin-dom of God. Who has God asked me to help? Who is family to me? Who has God placed in my life to offer me help when I so need it? Who is my neighbor, even among the strangers I do not recognize? I know I found a strange kin-dom of caring souls in isolation in Portugal. I have found the same in every place I have ever lived. This kin-dom has given me reason to live and to thrive. It has also given me to reason to be kin those who need help in living and thriving. All grace comes from that.
