



This Pentecost

"From one person God created every human nation to live on the whole earth, having determined their appointed times and the boundaries of their lands." Acts 17L:26 CEB

I have spent the last several years trying to figure out what is truly means to be white in America. I say this not because I want to be drawn into the often bifurcated conversation that surrounds the topic of This is way so much of our national conversation about race happens: Black, Asian, Native American, Hispanic-Good. White-Bad. Or vice versa. The situation is, of course, more complicated than that On one hand. I see skin color as an accidental quality, a quirk of genetics and passion and not of destiny. I did not choose to be white, but neither did any other other person chose to be black, Asian, Native American, or Semitic. On the other hand, I understand how people have used skin color as a weapon to further exclusive and damaging agendas, how arbitrary privilege, not hard work or compassion, has affected our educational, vocational, economic, and cultural institutions. Because of this. I am aware that I have benefited from many opportunities and favors that, as a person dealing with disabilities, that I would not have received if I had not been light-skinned. I did not create this situation, but I am responsible for the choices I can make or not make that could either improve the situations and make it even worse. And as a person trying to see God working through this, I feel this is also my responsibility to care for all of God's creation as it would like to be treated. But this often takes painful honesty. One of my Oregon colleagues, a conservative to the core gentleman, began his first day serving his church with a rather declarative statement. He was immediately and angrily drawn to an old photo hanging in the church's narthex. It was a gathering of church members, dressed in full Klan regalia, on the church steps. He pulled the picture off of the wall and handed it to the head deacon, suggesting strongly that it had no place hanging in a place that claimed to follow Jesus. He did receive some flak from this move, but the picture never reappeared and he is still



serving that church. I understand that challenge. I once made a report on hate groups rising in Pennsylvania to a church gathering. I was told not to mention such difficult fringe movements. They were a thing of the past, best forgotten. Perhaps they are, yet I have offered anti-racism and challenging history of American religion over the years and I have always received blow-back from those classes, mostly from people who did not bother to attend the classes (all elective, by the way). Racism is not a real problem, so I am told. You are making uncomfortable, I am reminded. I must admit that these stories make me uncomfortable too, but that might be the reason why they must be told. Our comfort comes at the price of others' discomfort and pain. It would be lovely to tell the story of White America's repentance as a straight line-slavery-abolition-Reconstruction-Jim Crow-Freedom Riders-End of Racism- with the South as the main villain. The true history, however, is more of a boomerang and it involves all of us-North and South, rich and poor, educated and struggling. It is a tug-of-war of redlining, gaslighting, putting people in their place economically and socially. It is a game where poorer whites and blacks are pitted against one another without any real benefit for either party. It is also a story of opportunity, of rising above the odds, of overcoming prejudices learned from our forebears, and the triumphs of collaboration. It is also narrative of sharing privilege and possibility with all so that all can be all that God created them to be. But that can be only be done if we explore truly what it means be to white in American. It can only happen if we see being white not as a default of being a human being, but as a unique story with its limitations and its challenges. As one important piece of the story, but not the whole story itself. This month we celebrate the birth of the Christian church-a holiday many call 'Pentecost'. The first outpouring of the God's spirit was truly an international affair. The ancestors of white people were there, but so were the ancestors of Asians and Africans. A quick glance at the localities listed in Acts 2 will confirm Members of the known world then were standing in Jerusalem's main square where listening to these Galileans-the white trash or the sharecroppers of their day-far from the Roman ideal
